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WRAFT

WRAFT is an acronym for the government lobby group – Waterfront Ratepayers After Fair Taxation – which was formed to support efforts to have waterfront ratepayer's taxation rates changed to reflect a fairer distribution of the load of taxation in municipalities with lakefront properties.

Since the provincial use of the Market Value Assessment (MVA) method of assessing taxes, waterfront properties in particular have had taxes increase dramatically because of the escalating values of those properties.

This has led to a disproportionate load of taxation on the owners of these properties versus the property owners not on waterfronts. In some areas, taxes for non-waterfront properties have decreased (as happened in Perry Township in 2004).

Your executive voted to join WRAFT in support of their lobbying efforts, as reported in the Winter Newsletter. Since then, the directors of WRAFT asked all executives of all the 100+ member associations to write to their M.P.P. and to the Provincial Ministers of Finance and Urban Affairs to voice concern about the cost of taxes as a result of MVA. Suggested copy for such a letter was presented at the last BLPOA Executive meeting for members to personalize and send.

The directors of WRAFT are now asking all property owner members of the associations that have joined WRAFT to also write letters to these members of the Provincial Parliament. As part of their ongoing efforts, WRAFT has recently submitted reform proposals to Queens Park. Their website will have details of this and other activities.

SEPTIC SYSTEMS

This is the second article on the important topic of **maintaining a healthy septic system**. In the last article, we discussed how septic systems work and the importance of having them **pumped out regularly – every 3 to 5 years**.

This article will provide you with information on how to find your septic system in order to dig out the manholes covers when you are ready to get it pumped out.

The easiest way is to locate the markers you placed over the manhole covers the last time. What – you didn't do that? Well then, simply get out the diagram of your septic system from your records. What – you don't have that? You could try getting this from an appropriate government department (county health or building and safety, for example).

No luck? Then get a steel rod and start probing the lawn. The septic tank will have to be at least 5 feet from the building and will usually be 6 to 24 inches underground. Once you outline the tank using the rod, you will have to start digging to find the manhole covers. There are usually two concrete covers with metal handles, each roughly two feet square, which are situated within four feet of each other. If you are still having problems, the septic service you called may be willing to help.

Once you've dug up the covers and the septic service arrives on site, then about another half-hour will be all the time you'll have to spend for the next 3-5 years on this important task.

Oh yeah – you might want to take a few minutes to mark those manhole covers for the next time!

Many people may not be aware that Bay Lake was once a Neighbourhood Watch community. To quote from their website:

"Neighbourhood Watch provides a means of reducing the opportunity for crime to occur, through the active participation of citizens. Community members are taught how to make their homes less inviting for thieves, how to participate in Operation Identification, making their personal property less desirable to burglars, and how to be alert to suspicious activity in their neighbourhoods.

Very few people are in a position to protect their homes and property all of the time and the Neighbourhood Watch program can help to provide a sense of security for individuals or families who leave their homes for any length of time. The program also helps to co-ordinate the efforts of the police and the community in tracking down criminals.

Strong individual, community, and police involvement is what makes the program such a success because – together we can prevent crime!"
