Bacon-Wrapped Dates

Bacon Pitted Honey Dates

- 1. Cut some bacon in half and partially cook it until it is nearly done but not quite.
- 2. Wrap one bacon slices around a pitted honey date and secure with a tooth pick.
- 3. Heat in 350 degree oven until the bacon looks crispy.
- 4. Cool slightly and serve (be careful, the date gets really hot!).

The combination of the salty bacon and the sweet date is great!

LAKE UPDATE

- The ice bid its final farewell on Friday, April 20th.

- Don't forget that the bass season opens on Saturday, June 23rd this year. Please do not start fishing earlier since even "catch and release" can disrupt nesting and negatively impact future fish stocks.

SUMMER BOATING

The nice weather is (almost!) here and many people will be getting their boats in the water soon.

Please remember to follow these important guidelines:

- Watch out for swimmers and non-motorized boats;
- Reduce your speed in no-wake zones and always be aware of the wake you are creating as it can damage shorelines and nesting areas;
- Be extra careful when re-fueling so as not to spill gasoline into the water (there are devices available that greatly reduce the risk of spillage).

Let's have a safe and happy boating season for everyone on Bay Lake.

SHARING OUR ROADS

While ATVs are allowed on roads in Perry Township the following rules apply:

- The driver must have a valid drivers licence
- The driver must wear a helmet
- There can be one driver only per ATV and no passengers
- Drivers must follow the ATV speed limits:
 - if the posted speed for a section of road is 50 km/hr or less, an ATV must not exceed a speed of 20 km/hr
 - if the posted speed for a section of road is more than 50 km/hr, an ATV must not exceed a speed of 50 km/hr
- An ATV shall not be operated in a manner that:
 - is a risk to the safety of the driver or others
 - may cause harm or material discomfort to any person from dust, emissions or noise
 - is likely to cause alterations, disruptions or destruction to the natural environment including erosion damage or degradation of the road
- ATV drivers must observe all the rules of the road including driving on the right-hand side of the road
- ATV drivers must drive only on the shoulder of the road or, if there is no shoulder, as close to the right side of the road as possible

GOOD NIGHT ... AND TURN OUT THE LIGHTS!

Do you have a light that stays on all night? Then please consider:

- turning it off...or
- switching it to a motion sensor light...or
- putting it on a timer that turns it off by midnight...or
- shrouding or re-directing it so that it doesn't shine across the lake or at the neighbours.

One of the most common 'complaints' we hear is of neighbours who leave bright or inappropriately aimed lights on – ruining night sky viewing or disrupting sleep. One property owner can make shadow puppets on the wall of their bedroom because of the brightness of the light that is left on all night across the lake.

Since people are not always comfortable approaching their neighbours about this, please take the initiative and make adjustments to your lighting. If you are approached by a neighbour, please listen and act in a spirit of cooperation and goodwill.

If your neighbours aren't an issue, your electrical bill might be! You can reduce your energy consumption by switching to lower wattage bulbs. A 'silver half moon' light bulb will not only reduce upward glare but can provide good illumination from only a 15 watt bulb.

THREE MILE LAKE UPDATE

You may recall that Three Mile Lake experienced a devastating toxic algae bloom last year – blue/green fluorescent scum 5" deep...and smelly. Since then, the property owners have been busy. They have revived their Property Owners Association and have been working with various government and environmental agencies to test and monitor their lake water. They have also had inspections done on the 521 septic systems on the lake. Forty-six (46) of these were found to be in bad condition and orders for repair or replacement have been issued to the owners.

The Executive of their POA conducted dock-to-dock visits during which they invited people to join the Association (\$100.00 per year, including a copy of *On the Living Edge*), performed a survey of the building, dock and shoreline elements, and handed out information on how to reduce the amount of phosphate that is entering their lake.

There are two things that all waterfront property owners can do to greatly reduce their phosphate production:

- 1. DO NOT USE FERTILIZER
- 2. USE PHOSPHATE-FREE CLEANING PRODUCTS

One line of phosphate-free products is called Nature Clean. Some of their items are available from both A&P and Robinson's Independent in Huntsville. We encourage everyone to start using these products – or ones like them – to help Bay Lake keep its phosphate level down. Let's all do everything we can to help Bay Lake stay healthy. No one wants a toxic algae outbreak to negatively impact our life on Bay Lake – and reduce our property values!
