New Winter Parking Rules

In previous years, there was an agreement with the Township that allowed people to park in snowplow turn-around areas. Unfortunately, the Township can no longer abide by this agreement due to the fact that they are using larger vehicles that need more room to turn around. The Township has posted notices, and they will be tagging and towing vehicles that are parked in the turn-around areas on all Township roads (yes, that includes North Bay Lake Road!). These larger vehicles also need more room on the road, so if you park there you may get a ticket. If don't have your own winter parking spot, try to arrange with a neighbour for parking space.

Annual Winter Reminders

- We want to avoid another incident of having a vehicle go through the ice, so please do not drive full-sized vehicles onto the ice.
- Be a considerate snowmobiler -- do not drive over people's docks, and be sure to drive around the boat ramp, keeping to the north side so as not to damage the concrete. It looks like most people have been doing that this year, but there are some tracks on the ramp itself.

Meteor Shower

Every year in late April Earth passes through the dusty tail of Comet Thatcher and the encounter causes a meteor shower called the Lyrids. This year the shower peaks on Wednesday morning, April 22nd. The best time to look is during the dark hours before dawn. Forecasters expect 10 to 20 meteors per hour visible from dark-sky sites.

Experienced meteor watchers suggest that you dress warmly, bring a reclining chair or spread a thick blanket over a flat spot of ground, and lie down and look up somewhat toward the east toward the constellation Lyra or the bright star Vega.

Night Sky

Venus is by far the easiest planet to see with the naked eye and outshines all the other planets with its brilliant white light. It comes closer to the Earth than any other planet.

Saturn appears pale yellow to the naked eye. Its famous rings can be seen with a small telescope, and they will be at their fullest again in 2017. You can sometimes see Titan, Saturn's largest moon, with small binoculars as well.

Mars is easily recognised because of its reddish colour. This is caused by the presence of iron oxide (rust) on the planet's surface. Because of its eccentric orbit, Mars' distance from the Earth varies considerably. Being only half the size of Earth, it can be difficult to observe, but a small telescope can show one of its polar caps and some bluish-grey surface markings. Its two moons, Phobos and Deimos, can only be seen with medium and large-sized telescopes.

It appears that this spring Saturn will be the brightest planet in the sky.

Woodpeckers

Lovely to look at...lovely to hear – except maybe when they find a particularly resonant part of your home! Have you ever wondered why...or how...woodpeckers drum like that? As to the why, the drumming you hear is the males and females communicating with each other and defining their territory. Luckily, this will last for only a few weeks.

As for how, woodpeckers have physical features that serve them well for hammering on hard surfaces. Their beaks are straight, have a chisel-like tip, and are strengthened by special ridges. Their skull structure helps protect their brains from repeated impacts. Even the angle a woodpecker strikes at provides protection in that it directs the impact to an area below the brain case. Their ears are half the size of other birds and are protected by an extra-thick membrane

The tapping of a woodpecker serves a different function -- to find hollow chambers or recesses in trees that might contain food.

Woodpeckers nest in cavities in trees, and it is the male who excavates the nest to get it ready for the eggs. The male also shares in the incubation of the eggs and in the feeding of the nestlings. Freed up from the 24-hour care of their eggs and offspring, females can – and often do – have more than one nest with different partners at the same time.

While you usually find woodpeckers alone or in pairs, they don't seem to mind if other woodpeckers are near by.

The way woodpeckers excavate trees helps them play a key role in the forest. The cavities they create serve as habitat for other birds and mammals, such as chickadees, bluebirds, starlings, ducks, fisher, pine marten, squirrels, bats, and chipmunks—and even wasps and bees! In addition, woodpeckers expose layers under the tree bark which makes it easier for other birds to find food.

So you may want to think twice before removing dead or decaying trees from your property. If you leave them, the woodpeckers will come...and many other creatures will follow!
