AGM REPORT

The 33rd Annual General Meeting of the BLPOA was held on Sunday, August 10, 2014, with about 35 members were in attendance. The President, Sarah Adams, opened the meeting and welcomed all those in attendance.

The guest speaker was Katy McGregor, joint owner of Northern Sanitation and Disposal which provides maintenance and care of septic systems. She gave a presentation emphasizing the do's and don'ts of managing our septic tanks and weeping beds. Her reminder for all to "keep off, keep out, and keep clean" certainly provided us with a good mantra. She also gave advice for frequent pumping of holding tanks. Katy was presented with a hand-crafted gift as thanks for her informative presentation.

The Financial Report was presented by David Adams who stated that the Association is in good financial shape. On behalf of Bill Paterson, Sarah Adams gave statistics regarding water testing, while Bob Nimigeon provided Membership figures along with his perception of Bay Lake from the Lake Steward's perspective.

Under Other Business, Sarah extended thanks to the year's Executive. Under New Business, Glen Vey informed the attendees that the Association from the Clear Lake/Bay Lake Hall was following the terms of their constitution and distributing the funds received from the sale of the Hall. The BLPOA is now in receipt of a cheque for \$2,200.00, and it is believed that additional monies were donated to various local charitable organizations.

Other discussions took place regarding the possibility of using some funds to enhance the boat ramp. In addition, a question was raised regarding the sale of a large parcel of land and

the possibility of severance and development. John Dunn, the Mayor of Perry Township, replied that there was a set process regarding all aspects of zoning and that this process could only be implemented following the sale of the property. It was confirmed that, under the new Zoning Map for Perry Township, all of Bay Lake is zoned "Residential".

The door prize gift basket of environmentallyfriendly products was won by Clara and Renso Meyer. The formal meeting was adjourned at 10:40 when Mayor John Dunn fielded a Q & A Session. Thanks to our Mayor for his time in this regard.

WATER LEVELS

We are all painfully aware of the wet summer and fall here at the lake. During a two-week period in September, for example, 13 inches of rain fell. This resulted in a number of uncovered boats sinking.

Please keep in mind that there is an agreement with the Township that they, and they alone, will monitor and maintain the outlet. While you may pass messages to them via the Lake Steward, Bob Nimigeon, or the Association, it is never advisable to trespass on the properties adjacent to the outlet. In fact, it is illegal!

AROUND BAY LAKE

The Fire Warning sign that used to be at the intersection of Bay Lake and Rochester Lake roads is missing. If you know of its whereabouts, please let us know so that it can be re-erected.

BLUE-GREEN ALGAE BLOOM ON CLEAR LAKE

Clear Lake has experienced a bloom of toxic blue-green algae. The North Bay Parry Sound Health Unit issued a News Release regarding Clear Lake on October 3rd. This was posted prominently and advised precautions to be taken immediately. These included:

- Avoid using water from Clear Lake for drinking, cooking and bathing;
- Avoid swimming as toxins should not be on your skin or swallowed;
- Avoid using the water for livestock or pets;
- Avoid eating fish caught in Clear Lake.

The quick facts noted were that the toxins can irritate the skin, and if ingested cause diarrhea and vomiting. At high levels the toxins may cause liver and nervous-system damage.

It is of note that boiling the water or using home water treatment devices will NOT destroy the toxins.

The causes of blue-green algae blooms include:

- Phosphates and anti-bacterial agents entering the lake;
- Removal of the natural native shoreline riparian vegetation, resulting in erosion;
- Wave action from boat wakes washing onshore;
- Grassy lawns whereby nutrients are allowed to flow unrestricted into the water;
- Usage of fertilizers/pesticides;
- Septic/grey water and/or holding tank seepages.

This could happen on Bay Lake. We cannot be complacent. We must be aware and vigilant.

We will continue to test for microcystins (bluegreen algae), which Bill Paterson informs us is the most expensive test we carry out.

So...what can you do as a Bay Lake resident?

- Do not use ANY fertilizers or pesticides...ever! (this is NOT a city with a waste-water treatment facility);
- 2. If you have an older septic system or holding tank, have an inspection and take the recommended action;
- 3. Reduce your boat wake and be respectful of the distance travelling from shore (wakes are most pronounced when the water level is high as it was this summer);
- 4. Use phosphate-free soaps, detergents and cleaning agents, and limit your use of antibacterial agents (these harmful agents are *not* removed when they go through your septic system, and will eventually enter the lake);
- 5. Restore your natural shoreline by planting native vegetation;

Let us all do our part to keep Bay Lake Beautiful!

It is not surprising that lakes with blue-green algal blooms see a significant drop in real estate values. Three Mile Lake had such a bloom in 2005. The Township of Muskoka Lakes ordered a total septic inspection of all properties. Property owners whose systems did not pass had to replace or repair their systems. This, though expensive, was the obvious choice compared to the possibility of continued toxic algae blooms.
